With all the load shedding here in Johannesburg, (electricity gets turned off for hours everyday in some for of sequence through one Neighbour hood to the next) the traffic lights (robots) get turned off too and traffic has to go back to the old school lessons of give way right, pass on the left etc..... ha! So what we have is a variety of privately owned (usually unregulated) companies running what we call "pirate taxis" which is basically a fleet of glorified mommy vans designed to hold 6-8 people but here in Africa you stuff as many people, groceries, chickens, furniture and whatever else into each van, slam the door, slap the side and we are good to go! Whether you arrive at your destination or not is a 50-50 chance.


